Spring Term in Nursery

Our Explorers

With the pandemic upon us it was difficult to welcome back the children into the Nursery class-room physically. However, Technology has made it possible for us all to connect and carry on with our learning virtually. Our little Explorers were all enthusiastic and completed lots of the weekly tasks and activities that were set. We were able to connect on Teams and played some interactive games. Many children sent in lots of photos and videos of themselves and family at work and play. They were all wonderful to see and some have now been displayed in the Nursery learning area for all the children to see.



Back To school At last

The Second half of the Spring Term we welcomed the Morning Nursery back into school Hooray! And the new children to the Afternoon Nursery. It was Immersion Day for our new Topic –What makes Wales wonderful?. All the children came in dressed in red to mark the special day. Lots of lively and interesting discussions took place about what we know about Mumbles, Swansea and Wales and what we want to learn in the coming weeks.





Lots to Celebrate

We celebrated a lot within the term. First week started off with St David's Day celebrations. To mark the occasion, the children all dressed in traditional Welsh clothing, listen to Welsh songs and music. They made placemats, coins and coloured pictures. We would have had some welsh cakes, but it would have been too much with the birthday celebration we also had on the day. March has been the busiest for birthdays in the class, hence we celebrated a birthday or two every week until the end of term. World book day was on the 4th March. The children came into school dressed as their favourite book character and were encouraged to share what they like most about their chosen character and book. Well done to Lenni and Molly for their winning costumes.

On Red Nose day, once again the children were able to wear something red, and or a red nose. Many children contributed to the cause and together created a *Funny is Power* picture to mark the occasion. We ended the term with a Dare to be Different Day and an Easter egg hunt in the back yard. Both Nursery classes had tremendous fun finding and counting all the eggs.













Spring Term in Reception

The children deserve a huge round of applause for how brilliantly they have coped with the changing situation, home learning and coming back to us at school. We are so proud of them. During our 'Explorers' topic, they focussed on story writing skills, developing a character and describing their appearance and story settings. In maths we looked at clocks and telling the time to the hour, sorting and classifying and addition and subtraction skills. It was lovely to see many of the children for catch-up sessions on Teams.

Back at school we started with an immersion day for our new topic, 'What Makes Wales Wonderful?' and have been lead by the children's fantastic EPIC planning ideas. They loved learning about the parts of a castle, and the castle small world role play area has been very popular. In literacy work we worked on Information writing skills, describing parts of a castle, and adding interesting adjectives to give more information about dragons—inspired by Jackie Morris's lovely book 'Tell Me a Dragon'. The children also loved making simple dragon kites and painting Oystermouth castle in the style of Gwilym Pritchard. In maths we have been exploring 2D and 3D shapes, repeated patterns and building number skills and understanding of higher numbers.





It's been a term of dressing up! Our topic immersion day, St David's Day, World Book Day, Red Nose Day and Dare to Be Different Day all provided lots of fun.













This has been one of the strangest terms ever with the children learning at home but seeing them come back to school after half term was a really special moment.



During home learning, our topic was Exploration. We had some brilliant adventures to different places, chosen by the children including the land of the dinosaurs, Antarctica, China and the Rainforest. The children were all amazing and I was so proud of their work and how well they all did.



Our second topic this term was 'What makes Wales wonderful?' The children worked so hard to come up with ideas of things they wanted to learn. The poetry and information writing from the children was amazing and they have had so much fun finding out about Wales and why it is important to us.







We celebrated World Book Day and loved sharing our favourite books with our friends. We also dressed up for Comic Relief and Dared to be Different. The children looked amazing and they had lots of fun learning at the same time.

HOME LEARNING

Unfortunately, we were unable to attend school in the first half of this term. Our topic was "Explorers" and through our Epic Planning, we decided to focus on "Space". We listened to the story of "Beegu" and the "Man on the Moon" and wrote our own Space stories. We also designed and made our own 3D rockets at home. We enjoyed finding out about the Solar System and making posters and models.

When we came back to school, we started our new topic. On the first day, we wore red, but didn't know what to expect! We learned what our topic was and we thought about what we wanted to learn in our Epic Planning. We learned how to find Wales on a map of the UK and the World. We wrote fact-files or information leaflets about Wales. For St. David's Day, we learned a Welsh poem called "Sglodion Di-ri" (meaning lots of chips!).

We used Britannica on Hwb to find out lots of information. Did you know there are over 600 castles in Wales? We have designed our own castles too, even using

designed our own castles too, even using Minecraft at home!

A term of dressing up!

As well as our Immersion Day and wearing red, we have also worn our Welsh costumes for St. David's Day, worn costumes for Red Nose Day and been our favourite book characters on World Book Day. We also dressed up for "Dare to be different Day"!













It has been an absolute joy having all of the children back in school! We have shared so many laughs together since returning to school and the children have really enjoyed finishing off our topic 'What makes Wales wonderful?'

Our famous Welsh singers Spotify playlist has been a daily treat for us to listen to during lunchtimes in the classroom! We also had a great time drawing caricatures of famous Welsh people! Research has been a big part of our literacy learning as well as creating our History of Mumbles leaflet. The children produced some very professional looking leaflets and would definitely get the job as a local Mumbles councillor!

We had great fun on the last day of term for 'Dare to be different day' with a wide variety of costumes/funky hairstyles and daring creations! To finish off the term, we all enjoyed a chocolate Easter egg hunt outdoors. Congratulations to Conor who won our egg hunt and earnt himself the chocolate golden egg!

I'd like to finish off by saying a big WELL DONE to all of the Year 3's for their happy, positive attitude during home learning lockdown. The work they produced for our first topic of this term 'Exploration of the rainforest' was fantastic and we loved our sharing session the first week back in school.

















It was lovely having the Year 4 children back together in school. All the children settled well into the classroom routine.

We welcomed two new lovely class mates to Year 4—Ellen and Pietro.

We completed our topic work on 'What makes Wales wonderful?'.

In Science we made models of upper and lower teeth. We learnt all about our different teeth and their purposes. We carried out experiments using eggs in different liquids to assess the damage occurred to our teeth enamel from drinking too much coffee and cola and also the effect of vinegar on the enamel.

We worked towards becoming Dementia Friends and we now have a greater understanding of the condition.

We have spent a lot of time preparing the garden for our Enterprise project. We will be growing different herbs, vegetables and flowers.

We are looking forward to our new topic 'Weird and Wonderful Plants'. We have thought of lots of fantastic ideas in our EPIC planning session.

HOME LEARNING

Pupils in Year 6 worked hard at their home learning not only continuing with the everyday business of numeracy and literacy but with some fantastic topic work too. We investigated Mumbles and researched the Mumbles Tram as well as other landmarks such as the Big Apple, the pier and the castle which make Mumbles such a special place to live in.

In our story writing the pupils put their vivid imaginations to good use. Evie wrote a story about a dog in a hole whilst Eden foiled a plot to blow up the lighthouse, and Owain ventured out on the lifeboat to perform a brave rescue of some fishermen who had got into difficulty.



We wanted to find out what it was like for the first people living in Wales. We investigated the homes, animals, tasks, art and lives of these first Welsh people. We designed zoos and wrote fantastic information leaflets using all of our research.





We were really lucky to be able to borrow some real Stone Age artefacts from Swansea museum, and got to handle stone and bronze tools that were found in Wales.

At the end of term we had a Stone Age Day to show what we had learned. We made weapons, jewellery, top trumps and quiz games, films and photo albums.





DESIGN TECHNOLOGY

Back at school we were able to complete the final part of our Ice Cream design task: the best bit of blending flavours, tasting, evaluating and trying again! It was a great way to get back into school life, we ate an awful lot of ice cream and had lots of fun.



And onwards to next term.....

We have planned out our next topic which investigates why nature is such a wonderful thing. We would like to find out about the oceans and the creatures that live there.












Updates

The Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Act 2018

The Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Act 2018 aims to create:

- "a unified legislative framework to support all children of compulsory school age or below with additional learning needs (ALN) and to support young people with ALN who are in school or further education (FE)
- an integrated, collaborative process of assessment, planning and monitoring which facilitates early, timely and effective interventions
- a fair and transparent system for providing information and advice, and for resolving concerns and appeals."

At Oystermouth Primary School we are following the Act and will be fully implementing this over a three-year period. The implementation period is expected to run from September 2021 to August 2024. The objective of the changes is a fair system for all learners with additional learning needs, putting the learner at the heart of everything that happens.

Communication with teachers

During Home Learning children and parents were obviously communicating with teachers more frequently in order to understand and complete activities. Now all the children are back in school the teachers are with the children from 8:45am until 3:15pm and preparing and marking work after. The teachers may not respond immediately to emails and messages but will do so when convenient for them. All the teachers have different work / home situations—some may choose to communicate out of hours because it suits them others may not.

Big Pedal

The school is taking part in the Big Pedal 2021, the UK's largest inter-school cycling and scooting challenge that inspires pupils, staff and parents to choose two wheels for their journey to school. The challenge runs from 19th April to 30th April. Under normal circumstance all the children can cycle or scoot to school each day of the challenge but due to COVID restrictions please see below the dates your child can cycle or scoot to school. When they arrive at school the bicycle or scooter will be stored under the gym until home time.

Parking

I would like to remind you of the importance of parking appropriately outside and near school. Vehicles are not permitted to park on pavements, on double yellow lines, double park or block driveways. The safety of the children is of paramount importance. Please do not park or pull in by Roger's Engineering or by the Bus Stop on Newton Road.
