




SUMMER TERM IN YEAR 2

We then tested them out by seeing how they flew at different locations. After lunch we measured the weather at different points of the beach to see how it changed.



Over lockdown some of our class put together a bid for some money in a Dragon's Den style competition. We were really chuffed when we were one of the winners and have been making our own Welsh reading books. These are going to be printed and sent home with the class mascots so that everyone can read and enjoy them.

We enjoyed a very sporty Food and Fitness Week. It started with a gruelling fitness session with Mrs Koscian involving a great circuit and lots of burpees! We also had a talk from Kate from the RNLI and a visit from two of our ex pupils who have made sport their careers. We went swimming in the Bishop Gore pool and had a tennis session too.

This term is, of course all about transition. Getting ready for Comp is an important part of our learning and we have had sessions with Show Racism the Red Card and Crucial Crew to help us. Parking

Air Pollution

Despite the ongoing global pandemic, air pollution remains a key health concern locally, nationally and globally. Air pollution, constituent of a complex mix of gases, particulate, chemicals, endotoxin's, wind-blown dusts as well as transition metals, is predominantly produced by industry and anthropogenic sources, but one key source is via combustion engines. All forms of transport therefore contribute to air pollution, and within our school environment car exhausts are most notable.

Air pollution formed from combustion engines has been strongly associated with the onset of numerous adverse pulmonary and cardiovascular effects, particularly in children. Asthma, bronchitis, cardiovascular disease and even lung fibrosis have been noted in patients exposed to low concentrations of air pollution over time. Even a recent High Court ruling stated 'air pollution' on the death certificate of a 14 year-old asthmatic child. Thus, air pollution, and that which comes from cars, is a significant health concern.

Air pollution is paramount in climate change. It is a key point which is receiving increased analysis as to how to reduce it on a global scale. To achieve this, small changes can have massive implications. In this sense, considering the use of our cars, especially in and around the school environment, is imperative, as not only can this reduce the exposure to the children, teachers and parents, but can also contribute to reducing pollution levels at drop-off and pick-up times.

Wrap Around

The school provides a Full Day Wrap Around Service. We are CIW registered and provide families with childcare from 8am to 5:30pm—Monday to Thursday. We accept children from the age of 2 onwards. We are in a position to open Wrap Around on a Friday if enough parents request the service.

The Wrap Around staff take on board the Foundation Phase curriculum and work closely with the teachers. The indoor and outdoor environments are fun, exciting, stimulating and safe—promoting children's development and natural curiosity to explore and learn through first-hand experience.
