Skills

WALT use comparative and superlative adjectives

We have used comparative and superlative adjectives before, so this should be an enjoyable task for you.

A comparative adjective is one which compares one thing with another, they often end in "er"

For example: A mammoth was bigger and stronger than a modern day elephant

A superlative describes something that is an extreme, and may end in "est" for example heaviest, strongest, brightest

Task:

Choose 3 Stone Age Animals and write a descriptive paragraph for each one using comparative and superlative adjectives. Your paragraph could include:

- What the animal looked like? Height, weight, fur feather or skin
- What it ate
- Where it lived
- How it moved
- Stand out features
- Evidence remaining today

You can compare with other Stone Age animals or modern day animals, it is your choice.
